The Value of Regional Collaboration

The Town of Ponce Inlet greatly benefits from the educational and networking opportunities provided to our local elected officials throughout Volusia County. One such opportunity is through the Volusia League of Cities, whose mission is to "encourage communication and promote common needs among Volusia cities within our state and federal government." https://www.volusialeagueofcities.com/

As the League's president since 2022, my objective has been to empower our elected officials. My goal is to have our advocacy efforts and programs regarded as a model for what local leaders can accomplish for our residents when we collaborate with state legislators.

Facilitating Dialogue and Advocacy

The League hosts regular roundtables with state representatives, allowing our local needs and concerns to be heard. To involve newly elected officials in advocacy, we created a mentoring program where experienced officials guide newcomers on best practices.

We also formed a countywide advocacy committee to protect home rule, provide grassroots involvement through our Civics 101 class, and expand legislative alerts to citizens. The League hosts a "Mayor's Call"

at least bi-monthly, enabling Volusia County Mayors to discuss issues, share concerns, and encourage attendance at county council meetings or outreach to state legislators as needed.

Collaboration through the Roundtable of Elected Officials

Apart from the League, the Roundtable of Elected Officials serves as another venue for collaboration among all Volusia elected officials. Convening bimonthly, it deliberates on matters of county concern. AFC Hosts Successful Summit on Flooding and Sea Level Rise

AMERICAN FLOOD COALITION

The American Flood Coalition (AFC) recently convened 43 mayors, county commissioners, and other local leaders from six states to address flooding challenges, foster relationships, and promote action. Participants represented both inland and coastal municipalities from Florida, Iowa, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, and Virginia.

The three-day summit featured sessions on cutting-edge flood solutions and the complexities of federal funding. Attendees left equipped with actionable ideas, resources, and valuable connections to enhance flood resilience in their communities.

AFC also invited senior officials from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Economic Development Administration (EDA) to provide guidance on accessing federal funding programs.

On the final day, AFC facilitated meetings between local leaders and their Congressional delegations on Capitol Hill. Discussions centered on critical priorities, including the need for comprehensive federal flood data, streamlined access to federal programs, and sustained investments in flood-resilient infrastructure.

COUNTY CORNER

Hello everyone. Here is your quarterly update from your Volusia County Councilman, Matt Reinhart.

I will start out by talking about our beach renourishment plan. Our first project that was mentioned in the past was the dredging of the entire Intracoastal Waterway by the USACE (United States Army Corps of Engineers). This project is expected to produce approximately 770,000 cubic yards of beach-compatible sand and will be stockpiled in the southern part of Ponce Inlet. If you remember, this is why the 50 beachside residents signed an easement. I have been asked if this means the USACE will just place the sand in a big pile there. The answer is no. As the sand is being pumped to this location, we will be moving it to the most vulnerable areas of the beach. Those most vulnerable areas will start with Ponce Inlet, Wilbur by the Sea, and the Daytona Beach Shores area. That project will most likely start in November of this year.

The second sand project will start around the same time and will be the dredging of the Rattlesnake Island area near Ponce Inlet. The piping for this project is already in place from a previous storm and is one we will start once we identify a contractor for it. We plan to utilize the same contractor the USACE is using for the Intracoastal dredging project, so we don't have to wait for another sand dredging barge. The beauty of this project is that it does not involve the USACE and will produce approximately 550,000 cubic yards of beach-compatible sand for the New Smyrna Beach area.

Now for the exciting news that we just learned. When the County of Volusia received the \$77.7 million grant from the



FDEP (Florida Department of Environmental Protection), we knew we would be using it to go towards a feasibility study for a longterm dune enhancement plan. The County of Volusia's Coastal Engineering Consultant for this study is a company by the name of Taylor Engineering. This study will have to be done for the USACE to produce any kind of beach or dunes enhancement plan. The purpose of this assessment is to identify and address vulnerable coastline areas, proposing long-term solutions to storm impacts and erosion. To gather community input, multiple public meetings and a virtual survey will be organized this summer. The assessment by Taylor Engineering will analyze historic shoreline trends, erosion rates, and communityspecific sand characteristics, considering various management measures such as groins, breakwaters, seawalls, and ecological solutions. The results will form a comprehensive plan presented by the consultant, guiding further funding and financial partnerships for the implementation of strategies to ensure the resilience of the county's beaches.

Community participation is emphasized as crucial for the success of the feasibility study, aiming to create a balanced and resilient coastal strategy that addresses environmental concerns and community needs. They will make recommendations on

long-term (50-year) resilience solutions. This will be a long-term project, lasting up to 5 years. When this is done, I would encourage the public to please visit the www.volusia.org/sandprojects website, where you can sign up for the complimentary beach recovery newsletter focused on keeping our community up to date on the various sand placement projects as well as the feasibility study.

An important thing to know is that when the USACE is involved and they produce this dune enhancement plan, it is like an insurance policy. Once measures are taken by the USACE and a future storm negatively affects our beaches, the USACE comes in and fixes the affected area at no additional cost to the community.

It is considered a 50-year resiliency solution and can last up to 5 years to complete. The "not so good news" about this project is that USACE only starts six projects per year, so they won't begin the study until probably 2025. For a short time, we thought we would start earlier, but we believe the recent event involving the barge running into the bridge in Maryland probably interrupted our plans.

We anticipate some funds to be left over from the \$77.7 million grant. We plan on using it to help with yet another dredging project at the inlet. This may produce an additional 3 to 4 million cubic yards of beautiful beach-compatible sand to assist with our renourishment efforts.

In the last update, I mentioned the possibility of convincing the USFWS (United States Fish & Wildlife Service) to allow work to continue on our beaches once the sea turtle nesting season began on May 1st. The good news is that the USFWS agreed.

I truly believe that the County of Volusia has a great relationship with all sixteen municipalities in the county. However, I will say that we have an excellent one with the Town of Ponce Inlet. I enjoy working with the citizens of Ponce Inlet as well as with Mayor Paritsky and the Town Council. The citizens of Ponce Inlet have excellent representation in their local government.

THE TALK OF TALLAHASSEE

It is my pleasure to serve you in the Florida House of Representatives. We had many great accomplishments during the 2024 legislative session. As your State Representative, I advocated for the most vulnerable in society. This is reflected in the bills protecting minors from harmful online content, protecting child abuse reporters from public record, strengthening antisemitism laws, and providing comprehensive tax relief, to name a few. I also supported bills reducing government regulations and strengthening property rights, and I will continue to seek further solutions to our homeowner's insurance issues. It wasn't an issue that began overnight; therefore, it won't be solved overnight. But you have a Legislature that is committed to solving the problem.

Below is a brief summary of some of the bills I sponsored and cosponsored.

HB 3: Online Protections for Minors

Online Protection for Minors: Aims to protect children under the age of 14 by prohibiting access to addictive social media platforms and by using age verification to prevent minors from accessing sexually explicit websites.

HB 1350: Salvage

This Bill added language to the current statute regarding salvage titles to include boats, vessels, and electric vehicles. This issue became more apparent after the recent hurricanes our state experienced, which destroyed thousands of vessels and EVs.



HB 7001: Reporter of Child Abuse, Abandonment, or Neglect

The bill protects a person from public records who reports child abuse, abandonment, or neglect.

HB 135: Voter Registration Applications

This bill requires a driver's license and written consent to change party affiliation on a voter registration. It also requires the driver's license office to provide a printed receipt of the change in party affiliation.

HB 165: Sampling of Beach Waters and Public Bathing Spaces

This bill requires the Department . of Health to adopt certain rules, issue advisories, and close public areas when necessary for public health.

HB 187: Antisemitism

This bill defines antisemitism as defined by the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance and may not be construed to infringe upon the First Amendment.

HB 621 Property Right

This bill allows a property owner to file a complaint with the sheriff to remove a person from unlawfully occupying their property and allows the sheriff to serve notice to vacate. It also strengthens the criminal penalties for trespassing, fraudulent documents, and sales. This addressed the so-called "squatters" issue we're seeing around the country. We will not have that problem here in Florida.

HB 1291: Educator Preparation Program

This bill prohibits teacher preparation programs from distorting historical events, identity politics, violating the Florida Equity Act, and theories based on systemic racism, sexism, oppression, and privileges, as well as teaching the institutions of the USA, which were created to maintain inequities. We will protect American history here in the state of Florida.

HB 7073: Taxation

This bill provides a comprehensive tax package. It includes several sales tax holidays and provides tax reductions and modifications in property tax, affordable housing, corporate tax, filing extensions, employment assistance, childcare, and strong families.

From the Town Manager, Mike Disher

This season of growth and new beginnings is the perfect time to reflect on our community's progress and to share updates on the many initiatives underway to enhance our Town's livability and charm. From the launch of new public safety programs to updates on infrastructure improvements and community events, there is much to look forward to in the coming months. Our dedicated Town staff has been working tirelessly to ensure that these projects meet the highest standards and serve the many needs of our residents.

Spring is a time for rejuvenation and active participation. I encourage you to explore the many programs and services available to you. Your participation and feedback are crucial to our collective success, and we value your input as we endeavor to make Ponce Inlet a place where everyone can thrive. Thank you for your continued support and engagement. I wish you a very happy spring and summer.

Audit, Reserves, and Budget Preparation

Our comprehensive audit of fiscal year 22/23 has been completed. For the eighth year in a row, we are again pleased to announce that there were no reportable findings for corrective action. This is a remarkable achievement due to the continued hard work of our Finance Department and audit team.

The Town ended FY 22/23 with a monetary increase of \$142,079 to the General Fund, which remains over \$4.1 million. We have a 53% reserve, which represents a little over 6 months of operating expenses. At a time of



economic flux and continued inflation, this reserve provides internal resiliency to meet the needs of our residents, regardless of these external factors.

The Town's budget preparation process for fiscal year 24/25 began in January and will continue through September. There are numerous opportunities for the public to participate in this process. Already to date, budget proposals from Town staff and the public have been presented at two meetings of the Essential Services Advisory Board (January and March) and at three meetings of the Cultural Services Board (February, April, and May). Board budgetary recommendations will conclude at the Cultural Services Board meeting on June 3rd, after which the Town Council will begin its review. The tentative meeting dates for the remainder of the fiscal year are as follows:

Please note that these dates are subject to change, so be sure to check for updates periodically. As always, your input is necessary in order to create a budget that balances the Town's operational needs, level-of-service expectations, and quality of life for the community. We welcome your questions, suggestions, and participation throughout this process.

Septic-to-Sewer Project

In February, Town staff learned that our septic-to-sewer project is on track to receive \$10.4 million in construction funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). This amount of funding is estimated to be sufficient to complete all remaining phases of this project, connecting the last remaining properties in Ponce Inlet to a sanitary sewer.


The funding will come in the form of a 100% principal forgiveness loan through FDEP's Supplemental Appropriation for Hurricanes Fiona and Ian (SAHFI). The loan will become available this November once the Town submits the necessary grant application documents to FDEP. The loan application requires an interlocal agreement between the Town and the City of Port Orange, which owns and operates the sewer system serving Ponce Inlet. The Town Council approved this agreement in April, while the Port Orange City Council approved it in May. The agreement governs the scope of work and cost-sharing arrangements between the two jurisdictions for the duration of the project. In an effort to further assist residents, Staff will research grant opportunities to help with connection costs and septic tank removal.

The project is the result of years of effort since it was first proposed in the Town's 2017 Sanitary Sewer System Master Plan update. Once finished, the project will benefit residents and the environment by increasing property values, ensuring long-

term sanitary waste disposal for properties subject to future sea level rise and septic tank failure, reducing nutrient load into the Halifax River and Indian River Lagoon, and decreasing the risk of harmful algae blooms and fish die-offs. Reducing the number of septic tanks is also required by the Town's Comprehensive Plan.

Town Regular Election August 20, 2024

Ponce Inlet's upcoming election is scheduled to be held on Tuesday, August 20th. Seat #4 on the town council will be up for election for a two-year term.

Golf Cars and Low-Speed Vehicles

The Ponce Inlet Police Department receives many questions about golf carts on our roadways. Please note that there is a legal distinction between golf carts and low-speed vehicles (those fitted with safety equipment and licensed as vehicles by the state). Golf carts are not required to have extensive safety equipment and are therefore not allowed to operate on roads other than those specifically designated for that purpose by the local government. In Ponce Inlet, golf carts are allowed only on Harbour Village Boulevard, per Code of Ordinances Ch. 74, Art. III.

On the other hand, **LOW SPEED VEHICLES (LSV)** are allowed to travel on all roadways with a speed limit of 35 MPH or less. These vehicles resemble golf carts but are equipped with headlights, brake lights, front and rear blinkers, seatbelts, windshield wipers, and side- and rear-view mirrors. They must be able to travel between 20-25 mph so as not to unreasonably hinder other vehicles on the roadway. Because they are road-worthy vehicles, they must be registered, titled, and insured, just like a cart. Finally, any person operating an LSV must possess a valid driver's license.

Crosswalk Safety

On May 3, 2024, the Ponce Inlet Police

Department conducted a crosswalk detail at the Winterhaven Park crossing on S. Atlantic Avenue. This was part of a county-wide public safety education and enforcement program known as "Best Foot Forward," in partnership with the local non-profit Bike/Walk Central Florida (BWCF). The program is designed to improve pedestrian and road safety through education, high-visibility crosswalk enforcement, and low-cost engineering at marked crosswalks. During the crosswalk operation, plainclothes officers crossed the street at marked crosswalks, giving drivers enough time to yield. Failing to yield to the pedestrian resulted in a warning or a citation. That morning, ten citations and warnings were written to drivers who did not yield to pedestrians in the crosswalk. Two of the drivers cited were Ponce Inlet residents. All drivers were given educational materials explaining Florida law. The PIPD will be conducting these details at different

A road user's right-of-way must be exercised with "due care." Traffic laws state who must yield the right of way to whom, but they **do not assign an absolute right of way**. Similarly, signals, crosswalk markings, lane markings, and other traffic control devices do not confer an absolute right of way for any user. Right-of-way must be exercised in a reasonable manner with "due care" for the safety of oneself and of other road users. No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle that is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.

Hurricane Season

The tropical climate in Florida creates the opportunity for hurricanes for a full six months each year. Although it seems like we just got through last year's hurricane season, the new season for 2024 begins on June 1st and runs through November 30th. While weather service predictions have improved over the years, the fact remains that hurricanes shift in direction and velocity very quickly, so advance preparations are important. Some years produce more frequent and/or more damaging hurricanes, and the 2024 season is expected to be much more active than normal. We encourage you to check out the recommended supplies and other considerations on the Volusia County Emergency Management website at https:// www.volusia.org/services/emergencyservices/emergency-management/getprepared/

Town staff has begun its annual preparations for the upcoming season, with each department reviewing procedures, roles, and supplies. In April, staff also participated in an extensive training exercise at the Volusia County Emergency Operations Center with other local governments and agencies. The training instruction was provided by emergency

management instructors from FEMA, and covered such topics as ICS (Incident Command System), emergency planning, cascading impacts, critical decision-making, the role of public information and social media, and situational awareness. Participants took part in a table-top exercise simulating a real-world disaster, requiring a coordinated response from multiple jurisdictions and agencies.

Watershed Master Plan

Collective Water Resources, LLC, is in the final stages of completing a Watershed Master Plan (WMP) for the Town of Ponce Inlet. The WMP report will be considered for approval at a Special Joint Meeting of the Planning Board and Town Council on Tuesday, June 4th, at 10:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers. The WMP evaluates the Town's stormwater drainage system for existing and expected development under various storm events and projected sea level rise conditions. The report includes specific recommendations to improve stormwater drainage throughout the Town, including additional storage ponds, inlets, and outfalls; flap gates to prevent backflow from the Halifax River on low-lying streets; the use of Low Impact Development techniques such as stormwater planters, bio-swales, rain gardens, and permeable pavement; and modifications to the Town's stormwater management regulations. The WMP is a continuation of the resilience goals and efforts undertaken by the Town Council since 2020.

The WMP will also allow the Town to improve its flood insurance rating through the national Community Rating System. With a Class 5 rating already, the Town's floodplain management program has been able to achieve significant insurance savings for its residents. The WMP is a prerequisite to improving this rating and, once completed, will allow the Town to make use of the points it has already achieved in its comprehensive floodplain management program. This effort will translate into direct insurance premium savings for properties in a flood zone.

South Peninsula Drive Sidewalk Project

This safety and mobility project has long been proposed to provide safety, recreation, and aesthetic improvements to the Town. The project entails replacing the existing sidewalk on S. Peninsula Drive with a new 8-foot-wide sidewalk along its entire length. The project was first proposed in the Town's 2017 Bicycle-Pedestrian Master Plan. Following the completion of a feasibility study in 2018, the Town applied to the Riverto-Sea TPO for design and construction funding in 2019. Funding for the design was finally awarded in late 2023. Now, in partnership with Volusia County, FDOT, and the TPO, the survey and design of this project are ready to get underway.

The survey of the entire corridor is expected to begin in June and finish in November. The Town will send out notice to residents abutting the sidewalk before this work starts. The design is anticipated to begin in January 2025 and last through September 2025. Once the design process begins, community meetings will be scheduled, and public participation will be a critical component of the process. The design will ultimately be approved by the Town Council. Construction is expected to start no earlier than 2026.

Sidewalk Vegetation Trimming

As property owners, we often focus on the aesthetics and maintenance of our landscapes. However, amidst the lush greenery and blooming flowers, it's crucial to remember our responsibility towards ensuring public safety. One aspect that is often overlooked but holds significant importance is the management of vegetation to prevent obstruction of roadways and sidewalks.

It is every property owner's responsibility to ensure that vegetation does not encroach upon or obstruct the adjacent roadways and sidewalks. This responsibility extends beyond mere aesthetics; it directly impacts the safety and accessibility of our community. Clear and unobstructed roadways and sidewalks are essential for the safe passage of vehicular and pedestrian traffic, especially at intersections where visibility is critical.

Overgrown bushes, tree branches, and unruly vines can obscure traffic signs and signals and even impede the line of sight for drivers and pedestrians. In addition to posing a visual obstruction, overgrown vegetation can create physical barriers, forcing pedestrians to step onto the roadways, putting them at risk of accidents.

Pre-Hurricane Tree Trimming

Since we are on the topic of vegetation, as storm season approaches once more, it's crucial to fortify our homes against potential hazards. While we may be seasoned veterans when it comes to weathering storms, proper preparation can mitigate risks for ourselves and our neighbors. One often overlooked aspect is tree maintenance. If you're planning to trim your trees, remember that contractors must responsibly dispose of trees and branches to prevent them from becoming dangerous

projectiles during storms. Don't wait until the last minute to address this; take proactive steps to secure your property and community safety.

Vacation Rentals

Renting out a portion of your property, regardless of duration, entails certain responsibilities that contribute to the wellbeing of our community. Foremost among these is to obtain a rental permit from the Town, irrespective of the length of the rental agreement.

With approximately 450 rental dwellings in our Town, it's essential to understand the categorization and regulations governing these rentals. Rental properties are classified into two distinct categories: longterm and short-term. Long-term rentals encompass any agreements spanning 28 consecutive days or longer, while short-term rentals are defined as stays of less than 28 days. However, it's crucial to note that shortterm rentals are only permissible in specific locations, including Southpoint Condo, Towers (buildings 1-6), Lighthouse Shores Condo, Antigua, and Martinique. Properties not falling within the specified shortterm rental locations are automatically considered long-term rentals. This includes single-family homes, townhomes, and the remaining condominiums.

Even within these designated areas, there may be covenants and restrictions within certain associations that prohibit rentals. As property owners, it's important to verify the permissibility of rentals within your respective communities to avoid any potential violations.

While our aim is to foster voluntary compliance among property owners, instances of non-compliance may necessitate intervention from the Town's

Code Enforcement Board. Rental violations rank as the Town's third-most common violation, trailing behind RV/boat/trailer parking and work conducted without permits. Our dedicated staff collaborates closely with various stakeholders, including homeowners' associations (HOAs), property managers, real estate companies, management firms, and online rental platforms such as Airbnb, HomeAway, VRBO, Expedia, and TripAdvisor. This collaborative effort ensures meticulous verification of code violations and facilitates timely resolution. Should you have any inquiries regarding rental regulations or if your HOA seeks clarification on these matters, please do not hesitate to reach out. Open communication and proactive engagement are instrumental in upholding the integrity of our community and ensuring compliance with rental regulations.

In addition to its daily maintenance and cleaning of Town facilities and parks, the Public Works crew has undertaken a diverse array of repairs, guaranteeing the smooth operation and upkeep of our community spaces. Ensuring the safety of our drinking

water remains a top priority. Through vigilant monitoring, regular hydrant flushing, and thorough water testing, we uphold the highest standards of water quality. We have initiated additional water sampling and testing to comply with state regulations. Fire hydrant maintenance and necessary replacements have been performed, along with systemic water valve assessments and maintenance. In tandem with these ongoing efforts, the Department has been busy compiling our annual stormwater report and preparing for an inperson audit by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.



Scheduled cleaning of the stormwater pipes at the north end of town is underway. This project involves cleaning and flushing over 7,000 feet of pipe and is anticipated to be finished at the end of May. These pipes include approximately 1,600 linear feet of exfiltration storm pipe systems, which serve a critical function in managing excess water. Exfiltration pipes are closed systems, in that they do not flow anywhere. Instead, they are designed to collect and then percolate water back into the ground through small holes in the pipes. Such systems offer a cost-effective method of drainage when the groundwater table is low. However, their effectiveness hinges on proper maintenance. It is imperative that residents and contractors refrain from depositing leaves, branches, or any debris near these structures to prevent blockages and costly clean-ups. Collaboration is key to ensuring that only rainwater enters the storm drain pipes, preserving their functionality for the future!

The Cultural Services Department enjoys the fresh air that Spring always brings! Since January, the department has helped coordinate 18 special events and programs in town, nine of which were organized by town staff.

In March, the Town participated in a guided hike in Ponce Preserve provided by our local PawPaw Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society. Nearly 30 participants walked away from this program with a plethora of knowledge. The hike also highlighted the work that 18 volunteers have performed throughout the park protecting native plants, and they are now able to educate others about their importance. It was a full-circle moment for many participants to express their appreciation to the volunteer group.

In April, the town held its annual Earth Day celebration known as "Ponce Preserves the Planet," with vendors and environmental exhibits posted throughout the trails. Approximately 110 attendees earned stickers at every station, along with an eco-friendly "Keep Plastic Out of Ponce" tote bag and a plant to take home. We were

honored to have this wonderful educational experience again in our community!



A significant highlight for the department was our volunteer workday in May. A total of 16 volunteers showed up to complete one of the toughest eradications in the world of invasive plant species—the air potato vine. With education and proper guidance from the experts at Young Bear Environmental, the group dug through dirt to remove buried air potato tubers. These tubers look like hairy potatoes that grow a new vine annually, outcompeting native plants for vital resources and tree canopy space within the park. The group pulled an amazing 121 pounds of air potato tubers and vines out of Ponce Preserve! With such a huge success and plenty of potatoes to claim, the department looks forward to the next volunteer workday, hopefully in the fall or cooler weather!



The guest speaker was Kevin Karella, who is a multiple Gold Star father, a prior combat helicopter pilot, and now a pilot and an increasingly popular author. His speech has always been one that makes an impact on all those in attendance. A special part of the ceremony was providing Ed Roloson, a member of the PI Veterans Memorial Association, with a Quilt of Valor for his continued support of our efforts to maintain the memorial and his willingness to always go 'above and beyond' in helping anyone in need. The ceremony ended with the 21-gun salute and the playing of taps.



The association continues to make headway in two initiatives to enhance the memorial. A "Founders Plaque" giving homage to those Association members who made the Memorial a reality is planned for the Veterans Day Ceremony, 13 years after the Memorial's dedication. We are also moving forward with plans to expand the memorial with two "Walls of Remembrance", which will allow more people to honor those who served with either a paver or a stainless-steel plaque.

And of course, we are already working on this year's Breakfast with Santa and the Christmas Parade, which were such a success last year. This year, we hope for even more people to join us for breakfast and more participants in the parade. This year's parade theme is "Favorite Christmas Movie" which should create some very interesting, decorated floats, vehicles, and walking participants.

PONCE INLET ANIMAL WELFARE "PAW" BY NANCY EPPS, PRESIDENT




Life is flourishing in our little colony as spring is winding down and summer is fast approaching. Our dedicated team of volunteers cares for our two resident cats, Tiki and Ruthie, every day with food, water, and love. We have an occasional visit from a black cat, but he must belong to someone and is just stopping by for a snack. Tiki and Ruthie have lots of places where they can get out of the rain, and they stay close to home.



If you would like to be alerted when either someone in our area loses a pet or if you find a stray animal, you can sign up for free notices from Paw Boost lost and found at www.pawboost.com. They will also post to their Facebook page. I see a lot of pets being returned to their homes via Paw Boost.

Please get your pets microchipped to aid in their recovery if they manage to get away from their home. Even unexpected events like tornadoes can suddenly result in free-roaming pets that have been displaced from their homes. In the middle of a disaster, having lost a pet just adds even more stress. Microchipping has become more affordable in recent years, making it doable for most pet owners.

I recently had to have one of my personal cats euthanized, and I used a service that came to my house and did it in the comfortable surroundings of his own home. I highly recommend it if you don't need emergency healthcare to try to save your pet. It was much easier than traumatizing the poor boy by hauling him to the vet first, then being in a cold exam room for the final event.
