

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A Moment with the Mayor

Congratulations to Councilman Milano and Councilman Villanella for being reelected to the Ponce Inlet Town Council. Gary Smith, our former Mayor and current Vice-Mayor, has been reappointed to Vice-Mayor. The Town Council remains committed to protecting the safety, well-being, and resilience of our community. Furthermore, we are committed to maintaining active engagement with leadership at the county, state, and federal levels to ensure our long-term prosperity.

Your Council members are deeply involved in various organizations that work to represent our interests at the onset of state legislation and county initiatives. At the state level, the Florida legislature addresses a wide array of topics such as property insurance, business regulations, and vacation rentals through proposed legislation. The 2024-2025 legislative session is set to begin on March 4, 2025. However, the Senate and House committees are already in the process of holding preliminary meetings to collect data and scrutinize bills prior to the session's official start.

Our legislative advocacy centers on the financial implications for residents, the provision of essential services that enhance our quality of life, and the safeguarding of "home rule." Home rule grants local governments the freedom to make policy decisions independently, avoiding a generic, statewide approach. This autonomy is crucial because each town or city has unique attributes that necessitate customized laws. Local elected officials are instrumental in educating state legislators

on how proposed legislation impacts our community.

At the state level, the Florida League of Cities (FLC), a nonpartisan organization, supports local leaders by providing resources and training. This support equips elected officials with the knowledge and tools needed to articulate how state laws affect their constituents' daily lives.



The Florida League of Cities (FLC) focuses on tracking legislation each session that could have financial repercussions for municipalities, particularly concerning issues like property insurance, short-term rentals, homestead exemptions, and statewide stormwater management. Local representatives participate in numerous committees and engage directly with legislators in Tallahassee. I personally serve as a member and Vice-Chair of the Utilities, Natural Resources, and Public Works Committee, which deals with vital municipal issues including coastal management and water quality. It is crucial for elected officials at the local level to ensure state legislators understand the real-world implications of their legislative proposals. Through the Florida League of Cities, your Council works diligently to advocate for your interests.

At the county level, residents' interests are represented through various bodies and committees. The Volusia League of Cities brings together the 16 municipalities of Volusia County to push for effective governance and to amplify residents' concerns across all levels of government. Council members attend bi-monthly meetings of this League, where I have had the honor of serving as president for the last two years, a term ending in January 2025.

Additionally, the Volusia County Elected Officials Roundtable tackles shared community issues like flooding and infrastructure maintenance. I am set to become the chair of this important organization in January 2025. These bi-monthly meetings take place at the Daytona Beach Airport and include all mayors, municipal managers, county council members, and others. These meetings are open to the public, and everyone is encouraged to attend.

COUNTY CORNER

Hello everyone. Here is your quarterly update from your Volusia County Councilman, Matt Reinhart.

First, I would like to thank everyone for their endorsement of my reelection. I am very humbled by this support and am looking forward to continuing to assist the residents of Ponce Inlet, as well as all citizens of Volusia County.

Some projects that are moving forward that I have mentioned in prior updates are those of the Second Chance Initiative, dune restoration projects, Transform 386, as well as other "outside the box thinking" tax initiatives for our citizens.



Therefore, I will start with the first and speak to the Second Chance Initiative. This month we are conducting the second Corrections' Job Fair, where soon-to-bereleased inmates will be able to interview for a potential job once released from custody. As I described before, these are individuals that are our neighbors and possibly our family members who made a bad decision and absolutely deserve a second chance to become productive members of our society. In addition, it will absolutely help our local workforce by assisting those local businesses that are otherwise struggling to obtain needed employees.



Secondly, with respect to our dune restoration project, the USACE (United States Army Corps of Engineers) will start the sand dredging project of our entire Intracoastal Waterway in January 2025. As mentioned, this will provide approximately 770,000 cubic yards of beach-compatible sand to areas north of the Inlet. The staging of this sand will be placed in Ponce Inlet, and our county workforce will transport it north of that staging location to those most vulnerable areas. The second dredging project of Rattlesnake Island will address the vulnerable coastal areas south in the New Smyrna Beach area (set to begin in April of 2025). On a side note, the USACE dredging project of the entire Intracoastal Waterway only addresses the channel area of the waterway and not the shoals/edges. We are in the process of testing that sand to see if it is beach compatible as well. Therefore, we can possibly dredge that sand, which may produce approximately another million cubic yards. Another good thing to point out is if it tests the way we hope, we have the grant money to fund it.

The third project I mentioned was that of Transform 386. This is the almost \$390 million grant project as a result of the damages caused by Hurricanes Ian and

Nicole. There are currently seven active homeowner applications for the Ponce Inlet area, and the Transform 386 Team is preparing to do a second-round review of infrastructure applications. The result of the first round produced \$6.8 million in studies for our municipalities (approximately 27 of them).

Other issues that we plan to work on are those of the much-needed attention for recent flooding issues. County staff is already preparing information for Council to review for our upcoming January special meeting to address this. The USACE is already involved as well.

In my last update I mentioned the beach feasibility study that is being funded with the \$462+ million grant we received. Part of that study will involve town meetings in order to obtain information from local residents and business owners on how they feel our beach needs to be maintained in the future. This will be called a "Beach User Survey." Be sure to keep an eye out for when and where those town meetings will be held. Either way, I plan on keeping everyone informed on the progress of this.

From the Town Manager, Mike Disher

Happy New Year!

The start of the New Year is when we take time to reflect on the hard work and accomplishments of the prior year and look forward to the next. Last year, at this time, the Town was finishing its repair efforts from Hurricanes Ian and Nicole and beginning preparations for future storms. Since then, much has been accomplished, including cleaning out the stormwater pipes in the north half of Town; dredging out the Town's three retention ponds; obtaining a state appropriation for a new generator at the fire station; and securing remaining eligible reimbursements from our insurance provider and FEMA. By the time Hurricane Milton hit in October, the Town was in better shape and better prepared to handle it.

The Town also worked closely with Volusia County beachfront property owners to secure temporary easements for the upcoming beach restoration project with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. This project will involve dredging approximately 770,000 cubic yards of beach-quality sand from the Intracoastal Waterway and Ponce de Leon Inlet for placement onto the beaches north of the inlet. To accomplish this, easements were needed from 50 private property owners to allow a portion of their land to be used for this project. Without their helpful cooperation and assistance, this project for the entire county coastline north of the inlet would have been in jeopardy or significantly delayed.

The Town accomplished many other important tasks last year, such as completing the Watershed Master Plan; modifying the Fire Station to house additional firefighter personnel; purchasing a new Quint 75 fire apparatus; renewing the 30-year franchise agreement with FPL; relaxing dock size restrictions that unfairly



penalized certain properties; enrolling in the Florida Department of Emergency Management's public assistance program to expedite hurricane relief; changing the zoning code to allow farmers markets as a special exception use in the Public-Institutional zoning district; transitioning from a volunteer Code Enforcement Board to a Special Magistrate; ensuring the town's court reservation system complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act; and achieving a perfect financial audit for the 8th straight year.

The Town Council's adopted budget for this fiscal year continues its efforts toward greater resiliency, with funds allocated for creating an Adaptation Action Plan; installing one-way backflow valves in storm drains on low-lying streets; updating stormwater requirements for properties under construction; and improving the Town's flood insurance rating. Updates on these projects will be provided periodically throughout the year.

The Town Council has set additional ambitious goals for our staff for 2025, some of which include extending sanitary sewer service to all remaining unserved parts of town; working with Volusia County to design the S. Peninsula sidewalk widening project; designing and constructing a replacement for Building "B" at the Public Works facility; creating a stormwater utility fund; and seeking grants for future stormwater improvement projects.

It is our pleasure to help make Ponce Inlet the special place that you call home. On behalf of all your employees with the Town of Ponce Inlet, we wish you a safe, happy, and productive 2025!

Your Town's Budget: What You Need to Know

Have you ever wondered how the Town decides where your tax dollars go? Here is a quick rundown of our budget process—the annual financial plan that keeps the community running smoothly.

The Basics

The Town, along with all local governments in Florida, operates on an annual schedule known as the fiscal year, which starts October 1 and ends September 30. Each year, we create a balanced budget—matching revenues to expenses—as required by Florida law. Our budget sets the stage for everything from public safety to parks, street repairs, and more.

The millage rate (the property tax rate) is a significant part of this process. The Town Council sets the millage rate once a year after factoring in everything from projected revenue and community priorities to inflation and maintenance costs. Florida's Truth in Millage (TRIM) Act ensures this process is transparent, with many opportunities for public input.

A Year-Long Effort

Budget planning starts early. From January to June, input is gathered from Town departments, advisory boards, the Council, and you—our residents. July 1st kicks off the 100-day countdown required by state law for local governments to adopt an annual budget. During this time, the Council reviews the draft budget at a public workshop, adopts a proposed millage rate (which sets the cap for taxes), and holds public hearings. The final budget and tax rate are adopted in September after everyone has had a chance to weigh in.

Your Voice Matters

Between the Town Council and its advisory boards, there are 12 public meetings from January to September where you can ask questions and share feedback. The Essential Services Advisory Board (ESAB) reviews budget ideas for Police, Fire, and Public Works, while the Cultural Services Board (CSB) looks at suggestions for improving our Town parks and the Historical Museum. It is important for Town staff and the Council to hear from as many people as possible during these meetings to understand what is important to the community. Attending these workshops also provides valuable information to the public about the laws, fiscal constraints, and choices facing the Town for the next fiscal year. This process ensures that the final budget reflects the community's needs and desired level of service while staying within financial limits.

Checks and Balances

Once the budget is adopted, it does not mean the work is finished. Each year, an independent auditor reviews the Town's finances to make sure everything is in order. For eight years running, our audits have been spotless—a testament to sound financial management. Reports for the past two audited years can be found at: https://www.ponce-inlet.org/509/Auditors-Reports. The FY 23/24 audit will be presented to the Town Council in April 2025.

Wrapping Up

Our budget process is designed to be transparent, efficient, and responsive to the community. From start to finish, it is about making the most of our resources while planning for a brighter future. About the Department

The Ponce Inlet Police Department operates 24/7 with 13 full-time officers, 4 part-time officers, and 2 civilian administrative staff. There are always a minimum of two officers patrolling the Town at all times. The Police Department currently has two vacancies and is actively looking to fill them. The Police Department only hires officers with previous law enforcement experience.

All Ponce Inlet Police Officers must qualify annually with their handgun, patrol rifle, shotgun, and taser. All officers participate in quarterly training at the Edgewater Police Department's shooting range to stay proficient with their weapons. They also participate in local active-shooter exercises with other police agencies in addition to classroom and online training. Our department is the smallest agency in the State of Florida to be fully accredited by the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation.

The Ponce Inlet Police Dept is proud of our response times to 911 calls. The PIPD responded to over 500 calls for service in 2024 with an average response time of 4 minutes, 14 seconds.



Ponce Partners Program:

The Ponce Inlet Police Department is looking for more "Ponce Partners." This program is designed to be a safety net for those who have severe health problems, live alone, or may be in the early stages of cognitive decline. Any resident can become a member by completing a short request form. When you become a Ponce Partner, you simply agree to contact the Police Department by phone each day before 12:00 noon. If we do not hear from you, we call you to ensure you are ok. If we are unable to reach you by phone, we send an officer out to check on your well-being. This program is set up to ensure our most vulnerable citizens have some form of communication each day. This program has been successful in rescuing several residents who had fallen and were unable to contact anyone for help. We have a great relationship with our "Ponce Partners" and look forward to their morning calls. Citizens Watch:

The Ponce Inlet Police Department is looking for more Citizen Watch volunteers. The Citizens Watch Program is an important and valuable asset to the Ponce Inlet Police Department. These volunteer members are dedicated citizens who generously donate their time to assist the Police Department as extra sets of "eyes and ears." Their duties include residential security checks, miscellaneous pick-up and delivery services for the police department, and regular patrols throughout the town. Our members are provided with a vehicle with amber warning lights, police radio, flashlight, traffic vest, raincoat, first aid kit, and a fire extinguisher. All volunteers undergo a background check and training before they begin.

Enhancing Safety with Innovative Technology: Bridgehill Fire Blanket Training

The Ponce Inlet Fire Department recently conducted a training session with the new state-issued Bridgehill Fire Blanket, a cutting-edge tool designed to contain and extinguish electric vehicle (EV) fires. As EVs become more prevalent, they present unique challenges for firefighters, as traditional suppression methods like water are often ineffective against the intense and prolonged heat generated by EV battery fires.

The fire blanket offers a practical solution, particularly in high-risk situations such as fires in parking garages or areas with significant exposure risks, like condominiums. This single-use blanket is deployed over the burning vehicle to smother the flames and prevent the spread of heat and toxic gases. Once in place, the blanket remains on the vehicle for several days to ensure the fire is fully extinguished before being removed along with the vehicle.

Our firefighters, including Lt. Reneker, DE Garcia, FF Kananen, FF Lord, and Lt. Juliano, participated in this training to

familiarize themselves with this innovative technology. Their commitment to mastering new tools ensures that Ponce Inlet continues to adapt to emerging challenges and remains a safe place for residents and visitors. This training highlights our department's dedication to staying at the forefront of safety measures in an everevolving world.



Search and Rescue Training

The Department is committed to ensuring our firefighters are fully prepared for search and rescue (SAR) operations during structure fires. Recently, crews participated in realistic training simulations, navigating a smoke-filled training building to locate and extract victims (represented by mannequins). After completing the rescue, they practiced essential fire suppression techniques. This critical refresher training keeps our firefighters' skills sharp and their readiness at its peak, ensuring they are always prepared to protect and serve our community.

Winter Safety Tips from the Ponce Inlet Fire Department

While Florida may not experience harsh winters, cooler weather still brings unique safety concerns. Here are some important tips to help keep you and your family safe this winter season:

Heating Safety

- Space heaters: Keep heaters at least 3 feet away from flammable items like curtains, bedding, or furniture. Always turn them off before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Fireplaces: If you use a fireplace, ensure the chimney is clean and free of debris. Use a screen to catch sparks and never leave a fire unattended.

♥ Vehicle fires: Regularly inspect your vehicle for maintenance issues that could lead to fires, especially during long holiday travels.

By taking these simple precautions, we can all enjoy a safe and happy winter season. Stay vigilant, and as always, the Ponce Inlet Fire Department is here to assist with any questions or concerns!

Holiday Decorations

- Lights and cords: Inspect holiday lights for damage before use, and avoid overloading outlets. Use outdoor-rated lights for exterior decorations.
- Candles: Consider battery-operated candles for a safer option. If using traditional candles, keep them away from flammable items and never leave them unattended.

Carbon Monoxide Awareness

- Detectors: Install carbon monoxide detectors in your home, especially near sleeping areas. Test them monthly to ensure they're working properly.
- Ventilation: Never use charcoal grills, camp stoves, or generators inside your home or garage, as they can produce deadly carbon monoxide gas.

Fire Safety Plan

- Exit drills: Review your home fire escape plan with your family. Make sure all exits are clear and accessible.
- Smoke alarms: Test your smoke alarms and replace the batteries if needed.

Outdoor Activities

Fire pits: Enjoy fire pits safely by keeping them at least 10 feet away from your home and other structures. Always extinguish the fire completely before leaving it unattended.

Town Hall Landscaping

The Town Hall landscaping project is complete! This project's aim was to replant areas previously cleared of aggressive muscadine grape vines with native species along the east side of the property closest to S. Atlantic Avenue. The Public Works Department and volunteers had removed the vines earlier this year.

Replanting of the cleared areas began in October. Dedicated volunteers organized by Barbara Davis helped pull vines and invasive plants that had reemerged. Volunteers installed the new native plants during the last week of October. The native planting plan was developed by Katie Tripp, with Natural Beauty Florida. Native plants include Beach Creeper, Beach Verbena, Fakahatchee Grass, Muhly Grass, Spotted Bea Balm, Tropical Sage, Wild Petunia and many other varieties. Thank you to all involved!

New Survey Encourages Public Input to Help Shape the Future of Volusia County Beaches

Volusia County is conducting a study to gather insights into how residents and visitors utilize its beaches and their perceptions of beach quality. The study will also examine alternative beach management strategies beyond the upcoming Coastal Sand Placement projects, which are scheduled to begin in early 2025 with funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

The initial survey in this study, which focused on beach usage and perceived quality, was made available online at www.volusia.org. Residents, property owners, businesses, and visitors were encouraged to participate. Participants who completed the survey and provided their email addresses received automatic updates about upcoming public meetings and the release of the second survey.

In February, the County will hold a series of public meetings to share information about potential beach resiliency improvements, address questions, and collect further community input. A second survey on potential beach resiliency measures will be launched in spring or summer 2025. This survey will build upon the results of the first survey and feedback gathered during the public meetings. It will focus on studying Volusia's distinctive coastal dynamics, ongoing historical shoreline trend research, and potential funding options for these projects.

Volusia County Secures \$2.5 Million Grant to Restore Coastal Dune Vegetation

Volusia County has received a \$2,576,838 grant from the National Coastal Resilience Fund (NCRF) to restore and strengthen coastal dune habitats by planting native vegetation. This initiative aims to fortify the dunes against storms and improve habitats for threatened and endangered species. The planting will align with the County's Coastal Division's sand placement projects, scheduled to begin early next year, enhancing the dunes' ecological function.



"This generous grant allows us to further our efforts to improve Volusia County's coastal habitats," said Samantha West, the County's Sustainability and Resilience Manager. "Restoring our dunes with native vegetation revitalizes wildlife habitats and supports the overall health of our ecosystem."

The funding will also support community engagement and education, fostering awareness among beachside residents about the importance of large-scale coastal resilience efforts. Through outreach, Volusia County aims to increase understanding of coastal dynamics and the critical role dune ecosystems play in environmental health and public safety.

The NCRF supports initiatives that restore and strengthen the natural infrastructure of U.S. coastal areas. It is a partnership among the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the U.S. Department of Defense, Shell USA, and Occidental. Volusia County is one of 94 recipients in the 2024 funding cycle.



Getting Your Landscape Ready for Cold Weather

Providing proper care throughout the year helps plants better withstand cold weather. Healthy plants are more resilient to cold temperatures and recover from damage more quickly.

Prior to a Freeze

Be prepared to move tender potted plants to warmer, sheltered areas if frost or freezing temperatures are forecasted in your region. Take stock of your plant covers and frost blankets ahead of time to ensure you're ready when the need arises.

Avoid fertilizing cold-sensitive plants in late fall or winter, as fertilizer promotes new growth that is especially vulnerable to cold injury. Similarly, delay pruning until spring, as freshly pruned plants are more prone to cold damage.

Protecting Your Plants from the Cold

Florida's winter temperatures can be erratic, so it's important to monitor the forecast and prepare to safeguard your plants.

- Covering Plants: During a hard freeze, cover plants completely, ensuring the cover extends to the soil to trap ground heat. For extra warmth, consider placing an electric light bulb (not LED) under the cover, ensuring safety precautions are taken.
- Wrapping Larger Plants: For cold-sensitive plants that are too large to cover fully, wrap their trunks with several layers of cloth or newspaper for protection.
- Removing Covers: Once temperatures rise above freezing, remove covers promptly to prevent overheating or moisture buildup.

Avoiding Risky Cold-Protection Methods

While gardeners use various techniques to protect plants, some methods can be impractical or even harmful. Overhead irrigation, for example, is effective on farms where irrigation systems are designed to run continuously from before the freeze until hours after temperatures rise. However, for residential properties, using a home irrigation system wastes water and can lead to heavy ice formation that damages plants.

Caring for Cold-Damaged Plants

If your plants suffer from cold damage despite your efforts, resist the urge to prune immediately. Wait until spring, as coldinjured plants will often sprout below the damaged areas, allowing you to clearly see where pruning is needed.

With careful planning and proper techniques, you can protect your plants and help them recover from winter weather challenges.



Watering Guidelines

Watering Restrictions

To ensure the efficient use of water for lawn and landscape irrigation, the St. John's River Water Management District has adopted watering restrictions. These restrictions are in effect year-round and apply throughout the District's entire 18-county area.

Rules & Regulations

During Daylight Savings Time the following rules apply:

Daylight Saving Time begins the second Sunday in March and ends the first Sunday in November. Residential irrigation is allowed at odd-numbered addresses from 4 p.m. to 10 a.m. Wednesdays and Saturdays and even-number addresses Thursdays and Sundays.

Business may irrigate from 4 p.m. to 10 a.m. Tuesdays and Fridays.

Restrictions apply to all water sources, including private wells and pumps, ground or surface water, and water from public and private utilities. New plantings may be watered any time for 30 days, then every other day for another 30 days. Keep the store receipt for proof of purchase. Hand watering with a spray nozzle that shuts-off when released is allowed anytime.

During Standard Time watering is allowed only once a week.

These guidelines apply to all areas in Volusia County, including cities:

- Water only when needed, and not between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Water for no more than one hour per zone, and no more than ¾ inch per zone.
- Restrictions apply to all water sources, including private wells and pumps, ground and surface water, and water from public and private utilities.

The following projects demonstrate our commitment to improving both the safety and beauty of our town. From stormwater management to preserving historical landmarks, Public Works is dedicated to making our community a better place to live and visit. We appreciate your continued support as we work together to enhance our town's infrastructure and environment.

Stormwater Projects

We are pleased to announce that the dredging of three stormwater retention ponds located along Beach Street and Inlet Point Boulevard has been successfully completed. This necessary maintenance was needed to ensure that the ponds function properly at their designed capacity. In addition, we are currently in the design and fabrication phase for new one-way drainage valves at Anchor Drive, Beach Street, and Old Carriage Road. Once completed, the installation of these valves will begin. The valves will prevent water from the Halifax River from backing up through the drainage inlets into the streets during extreme high tides and storm events.



Additionally, at the beginning of the year, swale construction and maintenance will begin around Town. These initiatives are part of ongoing efforts to enhance drainage efficiency and safeguard our community against potential water-related damage.

Ponce Preserve Boardwalk

Repairs to the Ponce Preserve boardwalk began on December 2nd, with work being done to encase the damaged pilings in concrete to enhance their safety and durability. The project is expected to be completed in January. The boardwalks at Timucuan Oaks Park and the Ponce Inlet boat ramp are under evaluation by an engineer. Necessary repairs and improvements will be planned and initiated following the assessment.

Historical Museum

Several important projects are scheduled to take place at the museum in the coming months. A new fence is expected to be installed at the beginning of January, followed by exterior painting of the museum buildings and the repairing of the boardwalk. These enhancements are part of our ongoing efforts to preserve the museum and ensure a safe, welcoming environment for all visitors.

Celebrating a Year of Growth and Community in 2024

As 2024 draws to a close, this department is reflecting on a year filled with achievements, new beginnings, and unwavering community engagement. Together, we have made strides in ensuring inclusivity, fostering connections, and preserving the natural beauty of our shared spaces.

Inclusivity in Action

One of our proudest accomplishments this year was ensuring the pickleball court reservation system complied with standards set by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This six-month effort was not only a critical step to meet legal requirements but also a reflection of our commitment to accessibility and inclusivity for all park visitors.

Innovative Programs for a Thriving Community

The department welcomed a new team member, Julie Cotton, this year, who hit the ground running with fresh, engaging programs aligned with our community mission. Another program made history come alive with an interactive archaeology walk in the park, sparking curiosity and connecting families to our local heritage.

Our partnership with the local Pawpaw Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society also flourished with a native plant hike in Ponce Preserve. With their continued volunteerism, they helped deepen our community's appreciation for Florida's unique flora.

Volunteers: The Heart of Our Ecosystem

Volunteers continue to be the backbone of our ecosystem restoration efforts. Their dedication to removing invasive plants at Ponce Preserve and Town Hall has been nothing short of inspiring. This year again saw hundreds of hours spent tackling invasive species, including a focused volunteer workday to remove the air potato vine. When partnering with an environmental consultant, volunteers learned about the challenges of managing invasive species while making a tangible impact on the park's health.





Resilience in the Face of Challenges

Hurricane Milton tested our community's resilience again this year, but we rose to the occasion. Town staff stepped up with preparedness and determination, playing key roles in recovery efforts and ensuring the safety and continuity of services.

Despite the challenges of storm recovery, we did not lose sight of community traditions. The department successfully hosted two beloved events: a festive Halloween party and a dazzling tree lighting ceremony, even braving unusually cold weather for the latter.











Looking Ahead with Gratitude

The department, with invaluable participation from the community of volunteers, hosted a total of 25 programs and events with over 1,300 total attendees. The department also coordinated 14 events within the town, 7 of which received cosponsorship approval by the Town Council.

As we wrap up 2024, the department extends our heartfelt thanks to the families and volunteers who have supported our work and enriched our community. Town Hall Invasive Plant Removal

In 2009 Ponce Inlet received the Award of Honor from the Florida Native Plant Society for the 9.6-acre Town Hall and Police Department native landscaping. Unfortunately, the landscaping was not maintained and became covered with invasive vines such as balsam pear and air potato, plus extensive coverage with grapevines. In August 2023, the Town Council established the volunteer program for invasive plant removal on Town properties.

In October 2023 the volunteers began removal of vines and invasive plants at Town Hall. There was so much debris that the Public Works Department had to bring in tractors and dumpsters to dispose of the vegetation that completely covered the trees and native plants.

Eventually, the dune areas were substantially cleared of invasive plants such as Brazilian pepper, balsam pear, and the native nuisance grapevines. In March 2024, Katie Tripp of Natural Beauty Native Florida Landscapes consulted with the Town regarding replanting the three dune areas in the courtyard of Town Hall.

In October, which is Native Plant Month, the volunteers removed the remainder of the invasive and non-native plants. Katie Tripp delivered and placed over 500 native plants on the dune areas, and 20 volunteers dug holes and planted the plants, which

were then surrounded with pine straw and watered in.

Within a month, several species of butterflies had discovered the pollinator plants that were blooming.

Native plants evolved and have lived in Florida since before Europeans arrived. Over 3,000 native plant species contribute to the biodiversity of Florida while providing shelter and food for birds, butterflies, pollinators, and wildlife. Many species of butterfly rely entirely on a single native species. With bird and pollinator populations declining, preserving native plants and habitats is central to the health of Florida's natural resources and wildlife. Native plants use less water and chemicals such as pesticides and fertilizers, which impact our natural water resources. 


Ponce Inlet Veterans Memorial Association

A Ponce Inlet native, Julie Davis, has her daughter, Pookie, who was a kitten when she was trapped fifteen years ago. A couple of months ago, someone in the county decided that Coco and the other two cats who had lived there all their lives needed to go, and they were trapped and were going to be taken to Halifax Humane

Society. Fortunately, one of the volunteer feeders arrived to feed and found out what had happened, and all three were rescued before they were taken away. 
